

## The world's greatest?

What is the most delightful PC on earth? There are different opinions on this, but if you are looking for the ultimate PORTABLE laptop, the Fujitsu Siemens P7230 is our favourite and in a class by itself. It is not that strange, being that its predecessor has followed us in thick and thin for the last year, and has proven to be sturdy, super light and has a battery life without competition. The only thing we have missed is a little bit more performance.

Then this successor arrives and fills all the missing gaps. It has the performance we were missing. The prototype we tested had an Intel Core Solo ULV-processor and it is said that the model can be delivered with dual-core edition later on. Together with the new chipset and the upgraded graphics, this model satisfies all normal computer needs.

In contrast to its predecessor, the P7230 has a more squared design. It is a bit thicker, but less deep. It is perfect for small bags and purses. The weight with the integrated DVD player is reduced with 100 gram to 1.2 kilo. Marvellous! If you don't need the DVD player, even though the widescreen display is excellent as a travel cinema, it is easy to add an extra battery to increase the battery operating time to nearly ten hours.

But there are more reasons to be cheerful. The most enjoyable is, of course, the integrated 3G. Insert your SIM card and you are always on. The antenna in the display makes sure that you have better coverage compared to mobiles and inserted cards. If there is no 3G coverage, there is EDGE, and you are connected everywhere. As the predecessor, it also has WLAN, Bluetooth, a fingerprint sensor and a TPM-security chip and all requirements you must have for other connections.

Despite the small size, a web camera is integrated. It is possible to have video conferences over Skype or MSN. The two speakers and the microphone are situated perfectly, and there is no acoustic feedback. You can even use the PC as a security centre so it monitors a room and sends a video recording when movements in the room are detected.

It has a 10.6 inches display, a small, but very good keyboard and priced at about 20 000 NOK, you will not get a better and more versatile companion at this moment in time.
